



My Mum taught me what to do in the house. When I was ten years of age, I used to wash up, wipe up, make my bed and clean the rooms. After I cleaned my room I used to go into the boys' room. I would get all the dirty clothes and put them out in the wash house. When I came home from school, my Ma used to make me wash the clothes. I used to wash and iron them.
